From The Pastor



Where are all the Catholics?

At present there are about 1.3 billion Catholics in the world, and around 70 million in the United States. That makes us the world’s fifth largest Catholic nation, just after Brazil, Mexico, the Philippines and China! (with 100 million). But it also means that we represent less than six percent of the global Catholic population. Put another way, 94 percent of the Catholics in the world aren’t like us. Two-thirds of those 1.3 billion Catholics now live outside “the West” (in the two-thirds world). And by 2050 it will be three-fourths. Only a hundred years ago it was the reverse. There are twice as many Catholics today in sub-Saharan Africa as in North America—a gap that swells with every passing day—and three times as many in Asia.

“Based on that,” Catholic journalist, John Allen says, “there’s a core insight about Catholic life in the early 21st century: American experiences, priorities and perspectives cannot always set the tone, because not everyone sees the world the same way we do, and increasingly, we’re not the big dogs anymore.”

There are now more than 4,000 foreign-born nuns studying or serving in the United States—mostly from Asia. They are younger and more educated than American nuns (73% with BAs). This adds to what we already know about non-American born priests. Today, roughly, one-fourth of all diocesan priests in the U.S. come from foreign countries, and three in ten American priests ordained in 2016 were born outside the country. Among some Religious Orders it is much higher. Ninety percent of the roughly 250 active SVD priests in America are in this category, including all our Provincials. It should be clear that the future of pastoral ministry in the U.S. is increasingly going to be in the hands of non-native Americans.

There are some problems with this. We often complain that foreign priests and sisters don’t adjust well

to American cultural expectations, and we have a hard time understanding some of them. On the other side, some worry that an increasing dependence on foreign priests and nuns may fuel a “brain drain” from churches in the developing world, siphoning off personnel from places that need those human resources far more than we do. We should encourage more native-born vocations and need to promote the cultural adjustment of foreign-born ministers, but we must also be careful not to exploit the material poverty of local churches in other parts of the world to satisfy our own desires. Cardinal Onaiyekan of Abuja, Nigeria puts it accurately, if bluntly: “Surely this is not where the Church wants to go, getting poor people to do jobs that the rich don’t want to do, as today happens in other walks of life.”

But there is also a tremendous upside. The US Church would flop without them! They help keep our parishes, schools, hospitals, and other Catholic institutions not only afloat, but dynamic and vital. And, more importantly, they can help us understand why our obsessions aren’t necessarily those of the rest of the Catholic world such as anti-Christian persecution. In many places it means literally taking your life in your hands every time you set out for church on Sunday. They can offer quite different perspectives on *Amoris Laetitia* and *Laudato Si*, and open our eyes to why our issues sometimes strike the majority Catholic world as incredibly insular. Of course, we can also teach them something—anti abuse and money management in particular. But, bottom line, they broaden us by offering the best faith formation lessons about life in the Church in the 21st century. He Makes Everything New

"Behold, I make everything new". (Rev 21: 5) Newness often makes us fearful, including the newness which God brings us, the newness which God asks of us. We are like the Apostles in the Gospel: often we would prefer to hold on to our own security, to stand in front of a tomb, to think about someone who has died, someone who ultimately lives on only as a memory, like the great historical figures from the past. We are afraid of God's surprises! He always surprises us!

Let the risen Jesus enter your life, welcome him as a friend, with trust: he is life! If until now you have kept him at a distance, step forward. His arms are open wide to receive you. If you have been indifferent, take a risk: you won't be disappointed. If following him seems difficult, don't be afraid, trust him, be confident that he is close to you, he is with you and he will give you the peace you are looking for and the strength to live as he planned us to live.

The women encounter the newness of God. Jesus has risen, he is alive! But faced with empty tomb and the two men in brilliant clothes, their first reaction is one of fear: "they were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground," They didn't even have courage to look. But when they hear the message of the Resurrection, they accept it in faith. Let us invoke the intercession of the Blessed Mother who treasured all these events in her heart and ask the Lord to give us a share in his Resurrection. May he open us to the newness of life that transforms all of creation. May he help us remember all that he has done in our lives and in the history of this world. May he help us to feel his presence as the one who is alive and at work in us. And may he teach us each day not to look among the dead for the Living One.

This Sunday's Readings

Describes how life was lived in communities formed not long after the death and resurrection of Jesus. Their focus is on communal life and the teachings of those who knew Jesus best, his apostles. The readings from First Peter and John both remind us that even among the apostles there is a tension between believing and seeing the reality of the resurrection. John tells of an apostle, Thomas, who refused to believe in the risen Christ until he had seen and touched his wounds. Jesus offers him the chance to do just that. Most of us are not in a position to demand such tangible proof from Jesus. But these stories are written so that we, who cannot see Jesus as his apostles did, can still come to believe and through that belief have life.
